Pre-Read the original 3 Pigs story before this version.

Lesson; Read the story aloud, focusing on expressive storytelling. Encourage children to predict what might happen next and discuss how the characters feel.

Linked Ideas

- Retell the story using props or puppets.
- Role-play the characters and have discussions about feeling unwell and how we help others.

Lesson; Teach proper techniques for sneezing, coughing, blowing noses, and hand washing using visual aids and demonstrations.

Linked Ideas

- Practice handwashing with glitter to show how germs are spread and cleaned.
- Create a hygiene station with tissues, soap, and water for role-play.

Lesson; Discuss how germs spread and why hygiene is important.


Linked Ideas

Create a matching game where children match pictures of objects from the story (e.g., wolf, nose, tissue) with their initial sounds. • Use simple CVC / CVCC words from the story. Words like "big," "bad," "pig," and "sick." Children can practice segmenting these sounds to form words. • Identify tricky words in simple sentences from the story. Create flashcards for words like "the," "was," and "said" and practice reading them in context. Copy the book onto a powerpoint and the children can stick a post it note of the tricky word on the screen if its on that page.

• Create character cards with simple descriptions and names.
